Public Engagement Goals

To identify and understand:

- Resident, community, and organization experiences with crime and violence.
- Factors which cause conditions of crime and violence in our community.

- Best practices to address the root causes of violence and crime in the community, as well as gaps.
- Key recommendations for addressing violence and crime in the city.

Points of Engagement

Engage Project Page

- 1.7K total visits
- 115 documents / reports downloaded
- 135 submitted quick poll answers
- 160 visited, 22 contributed to Ideas

Public Meetings

- One virtual meeting with 6 residents
- Two in-person meetings with a total of 11 residents

Community Engagement Toolkits

 6 toolkits completed with 70 individuals with lived experience

Residents' Survey

- 882 respondents
- 73% completion rate

Focus Groups

• 11 focus group discussions with 50 community-based service provider staff.

Advisory Committees / Working Groups

6 focus groups with 70 representatives

City Influencers' Survey

 17 City Influencers completed a condensed version of the Residents' Survey.

Highlights: Violence and Crime Trends

Respondents across all engagement formats generally agreed that crime and violence have **significantly increased** in the city over the past two years, and either **significantly** or **somewhat increased** in neighbourhoods.

Compared to two years ago, or compared to your arrival in St. John's (if less than two years ago), do you feel that violence and/or crime have increased, decreased, or stayed the same in: (survey responses n=881)

City

- Significantly increased: 65%
- Somewhat increased: 23%
- Stayed the same: 7%
- Significantly decreased: 2%
- Somewhat decreased: 1%

Neighbourhood

- Significantly increased: 32%
- Somewhat increased: 32%
- Stayed the same: 24%
- Significantly decreased: 2%
- Somewhat decreased: 3%

Highlights: Experiences of Violence

The forms of violence most often experienced by respondents in both their current neighbourhood and elsewhere in the city were **threats**, **criminal harassment** / **stalking**, and **physical assault**.

Have you or anyone in your household experienced any of the following acts of violence in the past two years? (Top three most reported acts of violence from survey responses n=636)

Current Neighbourhood

- Threats: 25%
- Criminal harassment / stalking: 17%
- Physical assault: 12%

Note: 54% of respondents did not experience any acts of violence.

Elsewhere in the City

- Threats: 33%
- Criminal harassment / stalking: 18%
- Physical assault: 13%

Note: 41% of respondents did not experience any acts of violence.

Highlights: Experiences of Crime

The form of crime most often experienced by respondents in their neighbourhoods and elsewhere in the city was **theft and stolen property**.

Have you or anyone in your household had any of the following crimes committed against you in the past two years? (Top three most reported crimes from survey responses n=643)

Current Neighbourhood

- Theft / stolen property: 45%
- Destruction of property:26%
- Drug trafficking: 24%

Note: 30% of respondents did not experience crime.

Elsewhere in the City

- Theft / stolen property: 19%
- Uttering threats: 19%
- Destruction of property:14%

Note: 26% of respondents did not experience crime.

Highlights: Reporting

Most respondents who experienced violence or crime reported it to the authorities – **37%**.

The majority of those who reported did so to the police – **94%.**


Highlights: Reasons for Not Reporting

Of those respondents who experienced, but did not report, violence or crime, the top reasons for not reporting were: (Top five most reported survey responses n=648)

- ➤ Believe nothing would change: 66%
- Lack of confidence in legal system: 57%
- Lack of confidence in police: 55%
- Fear of retaliation: 25%
- Unwilling to disclose/be further involved: 17%

Highlights – Areas Respondents Avoid

Are there any areas of the city that you currently avoid due to fear of violence and/or crime? (survey responses n=660)



Of the respondents who said yes, they avoid areas of the city, below are the areas they avoid and the reasons (survey responses)

City-defined

Neighbourhoods that Residents Avoid (Top three most reported survey responses n=437)

- Downtown: 89%
- Central: 29%
- Rennie's River: 13%

Reasons Residents Avoid These Areas (Top five most reported survey responses n=414)

- Perceived fear of violence or crime/potential risk of victimization: 57%
- Substance use/intoxicated people: 42%
- Aggressive/unpredictable/people experiencing homelessness: 29%
- Panhandling: 16%
- Media reports of crime and violence: 8%

Highlights: Challenges to Collaboration (Focus groups)

Lack of Awareness

 Groups highlighted the need for platforms to identify potential collaborators, share information, and seek advice more effectively.

Funding Challenges

 Unsustainable / precarious funding models and excessive time spent seeking funds leads to competition among groups.

Facilitation and Coordination

 A central coordinating role or position is needed to facilitate collaboration among organizations and address urgent issues.
