Discussion – Background and Current Status:

On February 27, 2023, Public Safety Canada <u>announced</u> that the City of St. John's would receive funding over a three-year period to work with community partners and stakeholders to develop and facilitate a Building Safer Communities Strategy aimed at addressing the underlying conditions that give rise to crime and violence, particularly for young people.

Public engagement was undertaken earlier this year to help identify priority areas and actions for the strategy for Council's consideration, as captured in the What We Heard report presented on June 18, 2024. The Building Safer Communities Strategy addresses several recommendations identified by the Building Safer Communities Steering Committee, partners and collaborators, and supported by research, evidence, and public engagement findings.

The Building Safer Communities Strategy eight priorities to address the root causes of violence and crime with associated goals and outcomes:

- 1. Enhance community capacity
- 2. Enhance City capacity
- 3. Increase public awareness and education
- 4. Strengthen coordination and collaboration
- 5. Advocate to address the root causes
- 6. Enhance research and data collection
- 7. Support and advocate for the urban Indigenous community
- 8. Improve urban design and infrastructure

Pages 33 through 42 of the Building Safer Communities Strategy outline 50 action items to help address violence and crime in the municipality. Examples of action items include the following:



- Continue the BSC Grant Program until 2026 to support projects that provide the following to young people:
 - Wraparound Support Programs
 - Family-Focused Programs
 - Educational Programs
 - o Programs for Racialized or Vulnerable Populations
 - Prevention Programs
 - Recreational Programs
- Explore opportunities for continued grants in future years based on lessons learned.
- Explore options for developing / customizing content for the City's internal training system related to diversity, equity, inclusion, and wellness.
- Develop a landing page on the City's public website to share resources and information related to violence and crime prevention.
- Hold networking events with community organizations, businesses, and different levels
 of government to strengthen collaboration in addressing crime and violence.
- Advocate for policy, program, budgetary, and/or legislative changes to help address the root causes of violence and crime.
- Add a question to the City's Residents' Satisfaction Survey related to safety to measure and compare changes over time.
- Collaborate with other municipalities to explore the feasibility of developing a tracking system for community hate crimes.
- Promote and share information about Indigenous Cultural Diversity Training to learn about the Indigenous groups in our province, our history, and how that information can be beneficial to our community.
- Identify areas of advocacy related to Indigenous peoples through the Joint Coordinating Committee on Indigenous Rights and bring forward to Council for consideration.

Timelines for completion have been identified for all action items:

- Short term: one to two years.
- Medium term: two to four years.
- Long term: five or more years.

All action items will be supported through an evaluation framework which will guide the work and inform measurable, outcome-based reporting on progress.

While project funding ends in March 2026, the Healthy City Strategy will provide an ongoing mechanism for the implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of Building Safer Communities action items.

The Building Safer Communities Strategy is a living document, designed to be flexible and responsive to the needs of our community. It will be reviewed and updated throughout implementation as City staff and the Steering Committee continue to receive feedback and recommendations from residents, community partners and collaborators.
